Create informative displays at local events, distribute voter registration information, and encourage eligible community members to register to vote. This is especially timely in presidential election years or during local election cycles.

5. Care Packages for Deployed Service Members

Organize a drive to collect items for care packages to send to deployed military personnel. Items like snacks, toiletries, and handwritten notes of encouragement go a long way in boosting morale and showing appreciation for their service.

6. Americanism Education in Schools

Partner with local schools to present lessons or activities on American history, the Constitution, and the responsibilities of citizenship. Offer to provide guest speakers or materials, and encourage schools to incorporate Americanism themes into January classroom activities.
